## OUR VESTRY ~ CHURCH LAY LEADERSHIP The Wardens' Report

This has been a year of challenges, changes, and opportunities. We started the year still sorting out how we continue to live out our mission and the life of our community when we are unable to gather in all the ways we once did and facing challenges not only in our financial resources but in the ways the covid has impacted the availability of volunteers. In April, Mother Amy announced her resignation which was a shock to us both personally and as parish leaders. Yet, as we talked with parishioners and Bishop Stokes, we began to see the ways this opened new opportunities for us. Our vestry has begun to be in conversation with the Bishop and Diocese about ways we can work with other churches to support and strengthen each other in ways that will help us all to thrive as we live out our mission as unique parish communities. We have also had the opportunity to bring on Father Mike as our Priest in a part-time capacity. Father Mike has brought an energy, enthusiasm, and fresh perspective to our community that has been a such a blessing. We are grateful to work with him and especially grateful for his gifts in the areas of pastoral care and communication which are so vital to the life of our community. Having him in a part-time position has also allowed us to better allocate our financial resources and puts us in a better position for our future. Father Mike is completing a six-month contract with us, and we are in the process of putting a three-year Priest-in-Charge contract in place. The advantage to having a Priest-in-Charge (as opposed to an Interim Rector) is that it gives us the flexibility to be in discernment about our mission and our future and still have the option of working with Mike as that future unfolds.

Another area of change in the coming year is the Rectory. Our Rectory has served us well for many years, but we may have come to the point where letting it go will give us more resources to work with elsewhere. In the past, we have rented the Rectory when we did not have a Rector living in it but that came with its own set of problems, and even if we were to rent it to a ministry or to someone within the larger church it still puts us in the position of landlords with the burdens of maintenance and insurance, while selling it could open up new possibilities for us, such as making repairs to our buildings before things become a larger issue, so that our facilities better support our ministries, and/or reinvesting in our endowments to better prepare us for future needs. While we are seeking feedback from the congregation on this issue and are listening to everyone's voice, we also want to be clear that we Wardens are both very much in favor of selling.

In all the challenges we have faced in our time as Wardens we have often said how grateful we are for each other. We could not do this job without each other, and we cannot do it without all of you. We are so grateful for all the ways you have supported our life together with your time, talent, and treasure, as well as for your love, friendship, and support. Our hope in the coming year is to focus the work of the Vestry to share the responsibilities of leadership and make best use of everyone's gifts, to grow our parish, and to revitalize our ministries.

#### Technology

The use of technology continues to grow as the Covid-19 pandemic presses us to practice our faith in new and different ways. We have continued to use technology for remote access to our services through the *Zoom* platform for 10am services, holy days, and other special services. Fr. Mike orchestrates the video and strategic use of additional microphones employed for better audio on Zoom. Fr. Mike also continues to adjust and assess the use of the sanctuary sound system, employing the wireless microphones to more accessible audio for all. Now using a Mevo Start camera, with a cell phone and lapel mic, we will continue to offer remote services on Zoom for those who are high-risk for complications of serious illness from Covid and for those not yet comfortable with in-person services. Whatever your reasons, we love you and invite you to join however is most comfortable and spiritually fulfilling.

#### **Personal Perspective**

#### TOWARDS THE PRIESTHOOD

The year 2021 began in the midst of the pandemic. While navigating fully online courses, the year started with me in the middle of my Anglican year of studies, and having ordained a deacon just a few months prior (October 17, 2020). In addition, I took the General Ordination Exams in early January, as is required of all those in process towards ordination into the priesthood. Having taken six exams, and by the grace of God passing all, I was approved to be ordained. The grace of God remained present, as I was ordained at Grace-St. Paul's Church on Saturday, May 8<sup>th</sup>, 2021 on the Feast of Julian of Norwich. While the weather looked ominous, with a storm ready to break out, the ordination service remained dry as it was held outdoors to increase pandemic precautions with fresh air. I was delighted to get ordained at Grace-St. Paul's Church with so many participating as my sponsors and voices of the people to call me into the priestly ministry. After a surprise turn of events, the grace of God kept me available as The Rev. Amy Cornell affirmed a call to position as rector of St. David's in Cranbury. I began as a supply priest from June through July, and accepted a call by the Wardens and Vestry to become the part-time priest of this Church on August 1, 2021.

With all the joy and excitement of this year, I understand the difficulties that exist. The pandemic has imbued a different kind of fatigue as we navigate our lives a bit differently, abiding by new rules in public places, remembering to carry a mask with us when we leave our homes, and reduce our gatherings – celebratory or in times of consolation. I experienced two graduation ceremonies remotely, had only immediate family present for my diaconal ordination and a reduced attendance for my priestly ordination. Still, as I said in my homily on Sunday, January 16<sup>th</sup>, 2022, "the best is yet to come." Bishop William Stokes, at my diaconal ordination, included the comment in his homily that I am an idealist. He was accurate in that I continually move forward from where I am into that ideal way of life that our Lord places before us, the way of life that leads to a place of love and peace – The 'ideal'. This ideal is *how* we step through each day. I look forward to embracing The Way beside this faithful Body.

#### My Priestly Ministry at Grace-St. Paul's

I further understand that Grace-St. Paul's continues to adjust to changing circumstances. Having once had a blustering Sunday School program, more than one full-time clergy member, a full-time sexton, parish administrator, and music minister, change has strained our parish life. The use of endowment funds over the last decade or more to sustain a way of life that was not meeting the ministry needs of the Church has led to minimal investments remaining. While our day-to-day operations might be different, we are still moving into tomorrow. We will wrestle with who we were like Jacob wrestled the angel at the River Jabbok [Genesis 32:22-31]. We will walk away different as Jacob did with a noticeable limp. Yet, our way of walking through and beyond this new dynamic of functioning as a parish will not impede us, but help us grow more fully. "Different" can be good, even great! Here are some notable areas (in our Communication) where 'different' is worth discussing:

#### COMMUNICATION

#### Website, and Social Media

In May, I setup a new website with the incredible assistance of Catherine Sopko. Updating the site made it a bit easier to use and keep updated. The site has been providing all the vital information, while also giving us the opportunity to remove details that do not reflect where we are today. Catherine has also helped us get back online with social media, including FaceBook, Twitter, and Instagram. At the same time of the new website creation, we changed our email servers. For years, emails were delayed or lost due to poor service through the old provider. Our communication continues to improve on all fronts.

#### **Phone System**

The old phone system in the parish administrator office operated various extensions for phones that were previously used in all office spaces. As of November 2021, we have switched to a system called Voice-over-IP (VOIP). The system required a new upgraded FIOS connection which was already in place and a new type of phone. Currently, we now have only one phone and will add phones as the need arises. New phones need not be wired into the wall, but simply require being connected to the wireless router. As such, older phones cannot work with this new system. Instead, a newer style of VOIP phone is required. In addition, the VOIP system provides lots of online tools to control our service. One feature has been linking my cell phone to the system. Essentially, I am always in the office, virtually. There are times I am unavailable and will not answer the phone. Still, our new system now no longer disconnects people who call and we can now retrieve messages with ease.

#### **Bulletins**

Last year, Fr. Mike gave our bulletins a new design and included more information. They will continue to adapt to the needs we have. Still, they help shape a sense of parish identity in their cohesiveness and informative nature. The bulletins include important events and news that needs to be conveyed. They also are posted online weekly. For our liturgy, they enhance our prayers as flower and candle memorials are made public, and parish-specific prayer requests are added to the Prayers of the People. The bulletins also share in recognizing the lay leaders for services, including our lectors and crucifer-servers. More recently, starting near the end of 2021, coloring pages have been included to edify all through imagery, especially our young members.

#### Mailings

Since the Fall, the part-time parish administrator and I have been sending out roughly 24 printed bulletins to parishioners who have been on our parish directory and with whom we have no email address. A few have been vocal about the blessing it is to have this service in hand for Sundays so that they can pray in the mornings along with us, despite without having the means to technologically be connected through a computer on Zoom.

#### e-Pistles

Fr. Mike's e-pistles are a wonderful means to convey events of the life of our Church to everyone who remains connected through email. The e-pistles are designed to convey important events, share important information, and even engage in some level of faith formation with contemplative reflections. Included are major notices from our diocese as well so we can remain connected to the larger Church.

#### ADDITIONAL THOUGHTS

Much of the above comments focus upon the mechanics of operating as a Church. While important, I also hope to share my thoughts on the liturgy of Grace-St. Paul's in its prayer services and services of the Holy Eucharist (mass). As a new clergy, I have been blessed by a flexible and faithful Altar Guild and Crucifer-Servers. Not only is orchestrating liturgy a new experience, but it is made complicated in learning the established routines and traditions. Open communication and flexibility has enhanced our way through the pandemic while drawing back in some former traditions that have been missed. The Altar Guild adapts to our schedule changes for holy days and other special services with grace and support, taking some burden of finer details from my shoulders. The Crucifer-Servers continue to adapt to the subtle changes to their routines as we shift liturgical dynamics, like now returning to bringing the gifts forward at the Offering. This liturgical support continues to enhance our worship, praises and thanksgivings brought forward to God. I am most enthusiastic in continuing cherished traditional services of the Church, looking to fine tune them for current contexts, especially due to the pandemic, and making them an experience through which we can encounter God together as a community. Celebrating God's saving grace through our Lord each Sunday, holy day, and special service brings such great joy to me by means of your faithful witness in participation.

As we live into a new way of parish life with a part-time clergy, I lean on your patience and understanding as I strive, with the Vestry, to establish routines and systems to keep sacramental services responsive to requests, like Baptism and funerals. Documents have been created for Baptism requests and funeral preparations, some of which can now be found on our website and others will be coming. With the amount of effort to navigate the organizational aspects of this Church, I also am committed to remaining faithful to the bishop through diocesan required clergy meetings, working to improve our facilities with our part-time sexton, and investigating possibilities for technology improvements for sound in the sanctuary and through Zoom. With the demands of time upon those necessary areas, weekly liturgical preparations (including hymn selections and sermon preparation), pastoral care, and expediting office work not covered by our part-time parish administrator, I recognize aspects we have been without for the latter half of 2021. I miss the third service option (originally Sundays at 5:30pm), the active Bible Study, and Sunday School. In my limited part-time work, I am already engaged in more than full-time hours. I pray that our study of Scriptures grows through other means, like that of the e-pistle. I pray our sharing of Scripture grows with bedtime prayers for your children, and having a lunchtime conversation about the readings of the day.

#### INTENTIONAL COLLABORATIVE MINISTRIES

Living into the way of part-time clergy life, I anticipate a greater need to work together with other parishes to increase our support of one another. As I have been engaged with youth programming between St. Luke's Ewing and Grace-St. Paul's (as well as a few other Episcopal churches with whom we have developed connections, Trinity Church Princeton and St. Matthew's Pennington), I believe that intentionally sharing in ministries of the larger Church will provide the support we all need. As we look to our ministries in 2022, particularly in areas where there are 'few' people, let us intentionally connect with nearby parishes to see how we can live boldly in the Spirit, together.

## THE DEACON'S REPORT

Dear all at Grace-St. Paul's,

What a year it has been! I am so thankful for being able to call our Parish my home and am so grateful to be able to serve here. This last year, I have had the wonderful opportunity to see Father Michael personally transition into his new role as Priest. What amazed me the most was to see how the congregation, let by the Vestry, came together so gracefully to transition Mike into the new role. The Holy Spirit was truly at work. And to see the level of energy Michael brings to the role is inspiring. Personally, I have tried to help Father Michael as best I can, either in-person during the liturgy, or on zoom. We have been able to maintain evening prayer service which has been very special. A highlight for me was trying to chant the Exultet at the Easter Vigil. Thank you for being so kind.

At the Diocesan level I have been active as a member of the Episcopal Community Services' (ECS) advisory council. As we celebrated a few weeks ago, ECS is a Diocesan-wide initiative to support church ministries to fight social and racial injustice. This last year, we made some terrific progress on the initiative but have a long way to go.

Personally, I was able to officiate two weddings this past year, which was also a major highlight. One was for my daughter which was incredibly special.

#### Music

Kira Scharf continues to bless us with her talents. Initially brought in to be our music leader for three hymns for one service each Sunday, Kira has graciously taken on more than was ever expected of her. She includes the Gloria and the Sanctus when they are appointed in the service. Often, she includes additional musical support. Once again, I am so very happy to report that our Grace-St. Paul's Prayer Chain has continued to be an active part of our community, our outreach, and our ministry! Father Mike and Deacon Tom have become welcome members of our Chain in this past year, joining our other "links" as we offer prayers and thanksgivings for all who ask. Nonetheless, we must stress that <u>every</u> <u>member</u> of our Grace-St. Paul's family is a *vital* part of our network. Our combined prayers always create the most powerful of intercessions!

How does the Prayer Chain and our Grace-St. Paul's prayer network function? When a need for prayer is relayed to any one of us via phone, email, text, in writing, or through personal contact, the need is quietly shared with ALL of the Prayer Chain "links." We then, each in our own way, offer prayers/intercessions on behalf of the individual in need *and* for their family and friends as well since *all* suffer in any time of distress. We continue to do so as regularly as possible for the duration of the need. We generally maintain the requested prayers for four (4) weeks from the initial contact. We request that if you have asked for prayers for someone, PLEASE <u>keep the Chain updated</u> concerning the status of that individual so we may continue prayers as needed and appropriately offer our intercessions *and* our thanksgivings.

We pray for all manner of need or circumstance, including thanksgivings – which are our *favorite* prayers! When we are IN church, many of the people for whom we pray are named in our Prayers of the People (generally first names only), and it is for these individuals in particular that we encourage our fellow parishioners to join with us in prayer, both while participating in our worship service <u>and</u> by taking the bulletin home to continue these prayers. However, not ALL prayers need to be "public." If you wish, the name for which you are requesting prayer may be kept as part of our "private" list and please rest assured that the Chain itself IS praying for that individual.

We always look forward to adding new "links" to the Chain itself. There is NO EXPERIENCE OR TRAINING NEEDED – all styles of praying are <u>welcomed</u> by God. Two other benefits to being part of our ministry are that your praying can be done absolutely *anywhere* AND there are NO meetings to attend!

#### Youth Ministry

While we have only one consistent youth from Grace-St. Paul's participating, we continue a successful collaboration with the youth of St. Luke's in Ewing. Despite the pandemic, we have slowly been rebuilding connections established with nearby churches prior to the pandemic. In the Spring, we joined an open conversation with the chaplain at Rutger's focusing on issues of the LGBTQIA+ community hosted by Trinity Church in Princeton on Zoom. Also in the Spring, we had several youth join a Psalm walk along the tow path in Washington Crossing Park on the NJ side of the river. In the Fall, we hosted two fellowship activities to the Corn Maze at Howell Farm which engaged several youth, a couple of guest youths, and children. Just before Thanksgiving, Mary Marks orchestrated a pie making event to support Christ Church in Bordentown's ministry to feed families in need. The youth of Grace-St. Paul's and St. Luke's in Ewing were the first to

participate in the diocesan youth-focused anti-racism workshop. Regular meetings, which were most Sundays, involved Scripture-based discussions or theologically rooted conversations. I admire the faith, questions, and compassion of the youth. We look forward to continuing our outreach projects and building collaborative ministries with St. Luke's Ewing, St. Matthew's Pennington, Trinity Church Princeton, and more.

## FACILITIES

#### Sexton

Our part-time sexton, Brian Leahy has been incredibly responsive this year, especially navigating leadership transitions well. He keeps the wardens and me informed regularly as issues are spotted and strives to be proactive where feasible. We are blessed by his service here and willingness to adapt to various endeavors.

#### Grounds

A few months ago, Brian and Fr. Mike worked to trim back the shrubs in the courtyard to reveal the long-since hidden narrow sidewalk that lay under them. After a rapidly necessitated clean-out of many old paint cans, we used some resources to give the courtyard door to the hallway near the bathrooms a coat of paint it so desperately needed, fending off wood rot on the exterior trim. When the weather warms, some repairs to broken trim will be addressed.





There are some issues to keep central. First, hopefully this Spring, we will work on finding a contractor to make necessary repairs to our sanctuary roof and replace the gutters to help direct stormwater in an appropriate direction. Second, the courtyard has a sinkhole caused by the collapse of the encapsulating pipe for the heating supply pipes. We will have to address soon before the heating pipes degrade and in order to increase our facility efficiency. Third, additional shrubs in the front will likely need to be removed as they have overcrowded the façade.

#### Sanctuary

Brian has worked diligently to procure new air filters for our sanctuary heating units. We are working to address some more issues as they become known. At least one, maybe two fans have stopped working. The cause is under investigation. Another sanctuary heating unit is not providing heat. We also have many light bulbs to replace.

On a positive note, our pew torches have received some solid anchoring with some custommade brackets screwed into the pews. The sanctuary, nave and chancel, are meticulously decorated by our wonderful Altar Guild. With many thanks to our Altar Guild, much has been done to improve our organization and cleaning out of unused, stored items that no longer serve a purpose for us.

The Rev. Dr. David Williams' Metropolitan Community Church remains our only outside religious organization borrowing space in our sanctuary although they continue to rely dominantly upon remote services. The United Methodist Church congregation has found a new worship space. The chapel remains unused as the Church of the Seraphim and Cherubim have found an alternate location.

The basement fire alarm project was completed to place us in compliance for the township.

#### Community Hall & Craft Hall

Our hall spaces go largely unused. We do hope to encourage facility use this year, so please spread the word! Perhaps we can continue to discern how these wonderful spaces might further our ministry as a Church. Share your ideas!
